It has been a great pleasure to connect with the AHS Wisdom Council and Elder Circle through 2022 and 2023. There has been an incredible amount of great work and input from the Council that has made a difference within AHS and for the Indigenous peoples living in Alberta. We have achieved much in the past year.

The Council's input and guidance as AHS implemented the 1-844 Indigenous Support Line has been invaluable and has had an immediate and positive impact. Launched first in the North Zone in May 2022, it spread to the South Zone and Central Zone over the spring and summer of 2023. Patient satisfaction is at 100 per cent – an almost unheard of achievement – and callers to the support line tell us in

their evaluations that they feel heard and respected by the Listeners. It has received accolades from outside the organization too, winning two national awards and one provincial award for patient experience.

Council also guided us through the implementation of the Patient Access to Indigenous Spiritual Ceremony Policy which ensures patient requests for ceremony can and will be accommodated consistently across AHS facilities.

It is achievements like these that will continue to break down barriers and support our staff to better meet the spiritual and cultural wellness needs of Indigenous peoples.

I understand and appreciate the value the Council brings to AHS and look forward to expanding and deepening our partnership in the months ahead. There is a great deal we still need to do and I look forward to the Council's ongoing involvement and advice.

Through advocacy and efforts of the Wisdom Council that began in 2022, the toll-free Indigenous Support Line is now available in the South, North and Central Zones with plans to expand the support line to the Indigenous Peoples of the Calgary and Ed-

monton Zones in 2024. This project was supported and endorsed by the Wisdom Council as essential to Indigenous peoples accessing appropriate health services in Alberta.



#### **KEY ACHIEVEMENTS**

For 2022-23, Wisdom Council moved ahead many milestone activities. We:

- Finalized Indigenous Spiritual Ceremony Protocol Policy was finalized and is now available in all AHS sites. For more information <u>Patient Access to Indigenous Spiritual Ceremony policy HCS-304</u> (ahsnet.ca)
- Implemented the Indigenous Support Line (1-844-944-4744) that was introduced and now available in the North, South and Central Zones.
- Reviewed the job description of the WC Advisor role and the WC Co-Chairs were involved in the interviews and selection process. Advisor now in place to support the important work of the Wisdom Council.
- Recruited five (5) new members with on-boarding and orientation. We welcomed Alvina Yellowknee, Bridget Fanta, Cody Twinn, Rebecca Morin, and Shannon McQuillan to their new roles.
- Revised our Terms of Reference, incorporating a definition for Elder and other key cultural references. It is expected to be approved at the next gathering of Wisdom Council in September 2023.
- The Calgary and Edmonton Indigenous Health Action Plan (IHAP) ReconciliAction committee met regularly with the Wisdom Council to provide updates and progress. Wisdom Council was instrumental in assisting with developing a framework to provide advice and direction to ensure culturally appropriate guidance was included in the plan.
- The Wisdom Council participated and provided direction on activities planned for National Indigenous People's month held annually every June. The WC Co-Chairs provided the opening and closing remarks to commemorate this important event celebrated by all at AHS.


