Concurrent Disorders Learning Series: Dr. Joel Billieux: Risk associated with the development of diagnostic criteria for behavioural addictions:

This video highlights important aspects of behavioral disorders and dysfunctional coping strategies versus healthy passions. The presenter considers the terminology of unhealthy coping strategies, and analyzes the impact of behavioural addictions on people from both a symptom and process based criteria.

Concurrent Disorders Learning Series: Daniel Kardefelt-Winther: When can new diagnostic categories do more harm than good (Internet Gaming Disorder)

The host of this video discusses risks of pathologizing normal, healthy behavior. The presenter analyzes the imprecise line between healthy and harmful behaviour; and concludes by noting the need for further research involving youth as participants, rather than subjects.
