- RE: Streamlining Animal Bite/Exposure Reporting to Public Health

Effective July 9, 2019 Safe Healthy Environments/Environmental Public Health will be streamlining the animal bite/exposure process to expedite reporting of animal bite/exposures and simplify the process for the public to access the information or care they need:

- Animal exposures that are negligible risk for rabies no longer need to be reported to Edmonton Zone Public Health. Please review <u>Animal Exposure Assessment Algorithm</u> for additional detail on negligible risk exposures. Examples of negligible exposures include:
 - No exposure to saliva of animal
 - Wound from police animal/service animal
 - Wound from family's own domestic dog, cat or ferret in Alberta that sleeps indoors
 - Wound from animals that do not typically carry rabies i.e. rabbits, squirrels, gophers, chipmunks, rats, mice, gerbils, hamsters, hedgehogs, woodchucks, groundhogs, muskrats and all bird species.
- 2. All patients with an animal exposure that is negligible risk for rabies should receive a copy of the <u>Patient Care Sheet: domestic dog/cat/ferret animal exposure wound public health follow-up</u>.
- 3. Tetanus-prone wound assessments should continue via usual Edmonton Zone process.
- 4. Report all other animal bite/exposures via usual Edmonton Zone process.
- 5. Public Health clinical consultation for concerning animal bite/exposures has not changed and is available via usual zone process.
