### COVID-19 Status


For the third consecutive week, the average number of daily new cases of COVID-19 in Alberta has decreased. There was an average of 969 daily new cases for the seven-day period ending on Dec. 29\*, compared to 1,318 cases the previous week (Dec. 16 to 22), a 26 per cent decrease. Although this decrease in the average number of daily new cases is positive, it is in-part a reflection of the reduced amount of testing taking place over the holidays. The Edmonton Zone had the largest number of new cases this week at 3,008 (44 per cent of all new cases in the province), followed by the Calgary Zone with 2,190 new cases this week (32 per cent of all new cases in the province).

[\*Note: Usually, the numbers provided in this weekly update capture a seven-day period from Thursday of the previous week to Wednesday of the present week. However, due to the winter holidays, the numbers in the current update represent the seven-day period from Wednesday, Dec. 23 to Tuesday, Dec. 29.]

From Dec. 23 to Dec. 29, there were 3,412 cases among individuals aged 20 to 49 years, which is 50 per cent of all new cases during that time period. However, cases continue to occur in every age group; this week, 928 new cases were reported among school aged children (5 to 19 years) and 1,292 new cases were reported among older adults (aged 60 years and older).

As of Dec. 29, there are 14,555 active cases in the province, whereas one week earlier on Dec. 22 there were 17,821 active cases in the province; this is a decrease of 3,266 active cases. While the Edmonton Zone continues to have the most active cases with 6,624 this week, overall the number of active cases decreased from the previous week by over 20 per cent for Edmonton, Calgary and South zones. The North Zone had a smaller decrease in the number of active cases (-5.6 per cent) and Central Zone had a small increase in the number of active cases (2.8 per cent). A full breakdown of the number of active cases on Dec. 29 compared to Dec. 22 for each zone is presented below:



#### **Hospitalizations and ICU admissions**

Although new and active case numbers have been decreasing, the number of individuals being treated for COVID-19 in Alberta hospitals continues to trend upward. On Dec. 29, there was a record of 921 individuals being treated for COVID-19 in Alberta hospitals, with 152 of those in intensive care units (ICUs) and 769 in non-ICUs. One week earlier on Dec. 22, there were 821 total hospitalizations, which is a 12 per cent increase in total hospitalizations this week. The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of Dec. 29 is as follows:

#### Other notable COVID-19-related information:

- On Dec. 29, Alberta surpassed 100,000 cases of COVID-19 confirmed in the province, with a total of 100,428 cases and a total of 3,687 individuals having been hospitalized, which amounts to 3.7 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 84,827 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- Alberta reached a grim milestone this week, reaching 1,000 deaths since
  the start of the pandemic. As of Dec. 29, 1,046 individuals have passed
  away from COVID-19 including 156 in the previous week (since Dec. 22).
  We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals, and to all
  who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From Dec. 23 to Dec. 29, 89,884 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 12,840 per day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 6.41 per cent to 9.55 per cent. As of Dec. 29, a total of 2,780,732 tests have been conducted and 1,650,655 individuals have been tested.

#### COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers, Influenza Updates Paused

Due to the holidays, our COVID-19 healthcare worker testing <u>dashboard</u> and influenza updates have been paused until the new year. Our annual influenza immunization campaign continues.

First Member of the Public Receives Vaccine in Alberta as Rollout Plan is Updated On December 30, Sheila Veeder, a resident at Riverview Long Term Care Centre in Medicine Hat, was the first member of the public to receive the COVID-19 vaccine in Alberta.



Veeder is one of thousands of Albertans living at a long-term care (LTC) or designated supportive living (DSL) site, identified to receive COVID-19 immunization during Phase 1A of the vaccine rollout. Residents in all LTC and DSL sites are included in this initial rollout and AHS will work with sites over the coming weeks to support on-site vaccine delivery.

The arrival of 16,900 doses of Moderna vaccine in Alberta yesterday is making it easier for AHS to start to bring the vaccine to the bedsides of thousands, immunizing long-term care and designated supportive living residents where they live.

In an effort to immunize as many Albertans against COVID-19 as quickly as possible, effective December 30, under the direction of Alberta Health, AHS will no longer

hold second doses of existing Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine stock on reserve from the shipments we have received to date, but will provide at least one of the two required doses to as many Albertans as possible.

The first 3,900 doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine that arrived in Alberta earlier this month were cleared for immediate single dose use, but some of the 25,350 additional Pfizer-BioNTech doses were held back to ensure second doses would be available because future shipments were unknown.

As of 11:00 a.m. December 31, more than 11,000 healthcare workers have received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine, as well more than 500 long term care/supportive living residents. With these changes in effect, we expect this number to rapidly increase.

AHS has now moved from Early Phase 1 of COVID-19 vaccine delivery to Phase 1A, which was originally scheduled to begin January 2021, meaning we are going to provide more vaccine to more Albertans, faster.

As of December 30, the following groups in Alberta are eligible for COVID-19 vaccine:

#### Phase 1A Groups

- Respiratory therapists\*
- Healthcare workers in intensive care units\*
- Staff in long term care and designated supportive living facilities\*
- Home care workers
- Healthcare workers in emergency departments
- All residents of long term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL), regardless of age
- \* Designates groups included in Early Phase 1 as well as Phase 1A.

This change was also supported by the decision by Pfizer on December 22 to allow its product to be moved from designated freezer sites so it can be delivered in LTC/DSL facilities, which increased the feasibility of vaccinating LTC and DSL residents where they live.

Assuming vaccine delivery remains as scheduled, everyone in the six groups listed above will have an opportunity to receive at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine before the end of January 2021.

To effectively allocate the vaccine in our province right now, Alberta continues to take a phased approach to offer immunization to specific populations who are being impacted the hardest by COVID-19, including residents of long term care and designated supportive living sites, and the care teams who could transmit COVID-19 to them, as well as the healthcare workers most needed to ensure workforce capacity.

We know that many of you have questions about when you will be considered eligible to receive immunization. We recognize that many staff and healthcare partners work with COVID-19-positive and higher-risk patients who are vulnerable to COVID-19 and we greatly appreciate the vital work you do.

We continue to carefully consider all groups and criteria to ensure COVID-19 vaccine is appropriately distributed the moment it arrives and are committed to transparently communicating all decisions about the immunization rollout as soon as they are known. All AHS staff and partners will have an opportunity to be vaccinated in the weeks and months to come as more vaccine supply becomes available.

AHS will continue to directly contact all Phase 1A staff and physicians who are eligible to receive the vaccine to set up appointment bookings. We ask that you answer any phone calls you receive from AHS, so you do not delay booking your immunization appointment.

# Online COVID-19 Immunization Appointment Booking Tool and Recruiting Immunizers

Starting January 4, AHS will launch a new online booking tool that will allow eligible healthcare workers to book their COVID-19 immunization appointments online from their phones or computers.

AHS staff deemed eligible to receive the COVID-19 immunization during this phase of the rollout will begin to receive an email with a unique link to go online and book their appointment to get immunized.

Emails will go out in stages, based on vaccine availability across the immunization locations. If you do not receive an email right away, please be patient and do not call Health Link. We anticipate immunization booking emails to go out to eligible staff over a number of days based on vaccine availability.

The link provided to each eligible healthcare worker is a one-time link that will no longer be valid after an appointment is booked. This is put in place to help ensure people are being booked in for their immunizations at the right time, based on the criteria outlined by Alberta Health.

The online booking tool provides identified healthcare workers with options to choose a preferred time, date and location to receive their immunization. The tool also ensures the healthcare worker books a second dose within the allowable date range. Please note that although the online booking tool facilitates the second dose booking, it is possible your second dose appointment may have to be rescheduled based on vaccine availability. If that is the case, you will be contacted by AHS and given instructions about how to rebook for a later date.

The booking tool will help speed up our immunization process and contribute to our goal of getting more Albertans immunized faster. More details will be available at <a href="https://doi.org/10.2016/nc.2016

With supply becoming more available and delivery schedules being firmer, AHS is doing everything possible to immunize as many people as possible with the available vaccines, including vaccinating on New Year's Day.

Immunizations are taking place across every zone, every day.

To ensure we are able to provide COVID-19 immunization to as many Albertans as quickly as possible, AHS is actively recruiting additional staff to join our team of immunizers. In addition to our public health immunizers, we are also actively recruiting other groups such as healthcare providers, healthcare retirees, undergraduate nurses and community pharmacists to provide immunizations across the province.

This will assist in the provincial rollout of vaccine and help us meet our targets of immunizing as many Albertans as quickly as possible.

We cannot thank our healthcare teams enough for all of their hard work and dedication. We especially want to recognize the many staff involved in the COVID-19 immunization rollout and sincerely appreciate the long hours and commitments you are making to help protect our staff, patients and public against COVID-19.



#### Thanks for taking our calls


