Seasonal Influenza Recommendations Continuing Care

Purpose: To prevent exposure to seasonal Influenza in all resident care areas in Alberta Health Services owned and contracted continuing care facilities.

Screening	 All residents should be screened for Influenza-like illness (ILI) on a daily basis. Health care workers should look for the following symptoms: Acute onset of respiratory illness with fever and cough, and with one or more of the following: Sore throat; Joint pain; Muscle aches; Severe exhaustion; Residents over 65 years may not have fever. Ensure all residents with respiratory symptoms are placed on <u>Droplet and Contact Precautions</u>. Conduct ongoing surveillance and monitoring for unusual clusters of illness in residents and staff and identification of possible ILI outbreaks, see <u>Outbreak Management Guidelines</u>. ILI Outbreak Definition: 2 or more cases of ILI within a 7 day period, with a common epidemiological link (e.g., same location or same caregiver, and evidence of transmission with the unit or site).
Point of Care	Staff caring for residents with symptoms of ILI must perform Point of Care Risk Assessment
Risk Assessment	(PCRA) prior to performing care, see <u>Point of Care Risk Assessment for Patients with Influenza-</u>
NISK / ISSUSSITION	<u>Like Illness (ILI)</u> .
Respiratory	Encourage residents to practice respiratory hygiene by covering their cough and sneezes (with
Hygiene	mask or tissues provided) and performing hand hygiene.
Hand Hygiene	Encourage strict adherence to hand hygiene.
Isolation	Adhere to droplet and contact precautions.
Precautions	N95 respirators are required for aerosol generating medical procedures only.
Influenza	Protect yourself, your residents and your families – get immunized! It is not too late to get your
immunizations	influenza vaccination, see Influenza Immunization Clinics.
Visitors	Instruct visitors, family, friends, private caregivers, etc. to:
	not visit when feeling unwell;
	perform hand hygiene upon entry into and exit from the facility;
	practice respiratory hygiene while visiting;
	contact facility staff if providing direct care to a resident.
